3 MR. KANYOCK: Good evening, this is the 2020
4 annual meeting of the Hyannis Fire District, and
5 we'll now come to order. My name is Dave Kanyock,
6 and I'll be moderating tonight's meeting.

7 In addition to having our meeting outdoors
8 and keeping with COVID guidelines and protocols,
9 we're requesting that everyone wear a mask and
10 maintain a distance of six feet from your nearest
11 person.

12 I would like -- I would like to ask all
13 eligible voters to hold up their red cards, please?
14 And keep them up till we get a count, make sure we
15 have a quorum.

16 Okay. We have the quorum, so we will
17 proceed with the meeting. Before we go any further,
18 I'd like to take a moment to pledge -- make a pledge
19 to the United States flag. Please stand and pledge.
20 I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States
21 of America, and to the Republic for which it stands,
22 one Nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and
23 justice for all.

24 I will now ask that Ms. LaFleur, the

1 clerk/treasurer, read the warrant.

2 MS. LaFLEUR: Warrant for the 2020 Annual
3 Meeting Of The Hyannis Fire District, The
4 Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

7 Greetings:

8 In the name of the Commonwealth of
9 Massachusetts, you are hereby requested to notify
10 the inhabitants of the Hyannis Fire District who are
11 qualified to vote to meet at the Hyannis Fire
12 Department, 95 High School Road Extension,
13 Massachusetts, Mass on Tuesday, May 19, 2020,
14 between the hours of 3:00 P.M. and 8:00 P.M., then
15 and there to bring their votes for the following
16 elected office.

17 One (1) member of the Board of Commissioners
18 for the term of Three (3) years.

19 And you are hereby requested to notify the
20 inhabitants of the Hyannis Fire District who are
21 qualified to vote to meet subsequently at the
22 Hyannis Fire Department, 95 High School Road
23 Extension, Massachusetts, Mass on Wednesday, May 20,
24 2020 at 7:00 P.M. and then and there to act on the

1 following articles.

5 all Towns served thereby, and by advertising in the
6 newspaper published within the Town of Barnstable
7 and making copies of the annual report and warrant
8 available fourteen (14) days at least, before the
9 date of said meeting.

18 MR. KANYOCK: Thank you, Ms. LaFleur.

19 I will now ask the people on my right to
20 introduce themselves.

21 MR. BURKE: Peter Burke, Fire Chief.

22 MR. SKENDE: Victor Skende, Commissioner.

23 MR. ATSALIS: Demetrius Atsalis,
24 Commissioner.

1 MR. SULLIVAN: Dennis Sullivan,
2 Commissioner.

3 MS. CRONIN: Laura Cronin, Commissioner.

4 MR. CROSS: Peter Cross, Commissioner.

5 MS. AMARA: Cynthia Amara, District Counsel.

6 MR. KIELTY: John Kielty, Court Reporter.

7 MR. KANYOCK: Great. Thank you, everyone.

8 Okay. Now, for some ground rules for
9 tonight's meeting, tonight's meeting we're asking
10 the procedure for public comment and discussion is
11 as follows. We ask that you come to the microphone,
12 state your full name and address so that we may
13 properly record your information and comments. In
14 order to hear as many views as possible, please do
15 not repeat what has already been said and please
16 attempt to keep your comments to three minutes. I
17 will be timing you.

18 Once again, we ask you to adhere to COVID
19 guidelines by observing six-foot distancing and by
20 wearing a mask at all time.

21 When you're at the microphone for the
22 benefit of the reporter, clerk recording here, I ask
23 that you -- it's okay to take your mask off that so
24 that -- you know, when using the microphone.

1 Additionally, any request for the amendment of an
2 article must be submitted in writing.

3 I will now call the first article, and for
4 articles submitted by the commissioners, Mr.
5 Sullivan will read the motions.

6 Article 1. To hear and vote to accept the
7 reports of the Treasurer, Chief Engineer, Board of
8 Commissioners, and all other Fire District Officers
9 and Committees, or to take any other action relative
10 thereto.

11 (The Board of Commissioner recommends
12 favorable action on all reports.)

13 MR. SULLIVAN: Article 1. I move that the
14 reports of the Treasurer, Chief Engineer, Board of
15 Commissioners, and all other Fire District Officers
16 and Committees be accepted as printed in the Annual
17 Report.

18 MR. KANYOCK: Do I hear a second?

19 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Second.

20 MR. KANYOCK: Second has been called.

21 Any public comment?

22 Seeing as there's none, all those in favor
23 say, "Aye."

24 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Aye.

1 MR. KANYOCK: Any opposed say, "No."

2 The article passes.

3 Article 2. To see if the District will vote
4 to authorize the Board of Commissioners to enter
5 into contracts for street lighting power and
6 maintenance for the period July 1, 2020 through June
7 30, 2021, or to take any other action relative
8 thereto.

9 (The Board of Commissioners recommends
10 favorable action.)

11 Mr. Sullivan.

12 MR. SULLIVAN: Article 2. I move that the
13 District authorize the Board of Commissioners to
14 enter into contracts for street lighting power and
15 maintenance for the period of July 1, 2020 through
16 June 30, 2021.

17 MR. KANYOCK: Do I hear a second?

18 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Second.

19 MR. KANYOCK: All those in favor say, "Aye."

20 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Aye.

21 MR. KANYOCK: Any opposed?

22 The article passes.

23 Article number 3. To see if the District
24 will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of

1 \$40,000 for street lighting power and maintenance
2 for the period July 1, 2020 through June 30, 2021,
3 or to take any other action relative thereto.

4 (The Board of Commissioners recommends
5 favorable action.)

6 MR. SULLIVAN: Article 3. I move that the
7 District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of
8 \$40,000 for street lighting power and maintenance
9 for the period July 1, 2020 through June 30, 2021.

10 MR. KANYOCK: Do I hear a second?

11 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Second.

12 MR. KANYOCK: All those in favor say, "Aye."

13 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Aye.

14 MR. KANYOCK: Any opposed?

15 The article passes.

16 Article 4. To see if the District will vote
17 to set the following salaries of elected -- elective
18 and appointed District Officers for the fiscal year
19 2021 as follows: Board of Commissioners, \$5,100
20 each plus an additional \$1,000 for the Chairman of
21 the Board of Commissioners; Clerk/Treasurer,
22 \$75,895; Moderator, \$300; Assessors \$50 each; and
23 Tax Collector \$2,200, or to take any other action
24 relative thereto.

1 (The Board of Commissioner recommends
2 favorable action.)

3 MR. SULLIVAN: Article 4. I move that the
4 District vote to set the following salaries of
5 elective and appointed District Officers for the
6 fiscal year 2021 as follows: Board of Commissioner,
7 \$5,100 each plus an additional \$1,000 for the
8 Chairman of the Board of Commissioners;
9 Clerk/Treasurer, \$75,895; Moderator, \$300;
10 Assessors, \$50 each; and Tax Collector, \$2,200.

11 MR. KANYOCK: Do I hear a second?

12 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Second.

13 MR. KANYOCK: All those in favor say, "Aye."

14 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Aye.

15 MR. KANYOCK: Any opposed?

16 The ayes have it. The article passes.

17 Article number 5. To see if the District
18 will vote to raise and appropriate and/or to
19 transfer and appropriate from available funds the
20 following amounts for fiscal year 2021: \$821,500
21 for equipment for fires and rescues; \$105,045 for
22 District Officers; \$12,616,328 for Incidental and
23 Current Expenses; and \$1,265,274 for Retirement Fund
24 Assessment, or to take any other action relative

1 thereto.

2 (The Board of Commissioner recommends
3 favorable action.)

4 MR. SULLIVAN: Article 5. I move that the
5 District vote to appropriate the following sums for
6 fiscal year 2021: \$821,500 for equipment for fires
7 and rescues; \$105,045 for District Officers;
8 \$12,616,328 for Incidentals and Current Expenses;
9 and \$1,265,274 for Retirement Fund Assessment, and
10 that to meet said appropriations \$3,292,000 will be
11 transferred from the Ambulance Account and the
12 remainder to be raised from the tax levy.

13 MR. KANYOCK: Do I hear a second?

14 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Second.

15 MR. KANYOCK: All in favor say, "Aye."

16 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Aye.

17 Discussions.

18 MR. KANYOCK: Discussions. I'm sorry. Is
19 there any opposed?

20 Is there any discussion?

21 MR. SULLIVAN: Yes.

22 MS. KRAU: Thank you. My question, if I
23 understand it, --

24 MS. AMARA: Name and address.

1 MS. KRAU: -- there are eight new --

2 MR. KANYOCK: Excuse me. Could we have your
3 name and address, please?

4 MS. KRAU: My name is Deb Krau, and I live
5 at Pram Road. And this will not make me want to
6 talk?

7 HYANNIS FIREFIGHTER: There's feedback.

8 MS. KRAU: Thank you.

9 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: He's going to make it
10 work better for you.

11 MS. KRAU: Thank you. Is this better?

12 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Yeah.

13 MS. KRAU: Okay. The Chief's report, which
14 is included in our annual, talks about the fact that
15 there are eight new positions being added in this
16 budget. We're not seeing the full cost of them yet
17 because they're going to be spaced in. So here are
18 my questions.

19 First, what's the fully loaded cost of
20 adding an FTE to the EMT firefighters? Secondly,
21 for every one that we add, we should hopefully see a
22 decrease in overtime. So the question here is, how
23 much -- so the question is, how much has the
24 overtime budget been decreased due to the fact that

1 we're adding eight new FTEs by the time the year is
2 done?

3 And thirdly, how much of the annual cost of
4 those eight FTEs is currently in the budget?
5 Because if it's not there now, it's going to be
6 there next year. And I'm thinking, adding eight
7 FTEs, are we going to be staffing another ambulance
8 or something like that? Exactly what do we expect
9 the new FTEs to do?

10 Thank you.

11 CHIEF BURKE: Certainly trying to avoid any
12 further feedbacks. That sounds okay.

13 Thank you for the questions. So to answer
14 them in order, the proximate cost of a new FTE is
15 driven salary-wise by contract. So that all-in
16 costs per FTE is around \$80,000 for the first year,
17 and then there's other costs associated, such as
18 insurance, retirement assessment, and such as that,
19 which is approximately the \$15,000.

20 To answer your question, what's in this
21 current budget, is proposed to hire four in October
22 and a second four in April. So you're absolutely
23 right, the full-blown cost will not be seen until
24 next fiscal year.

1 And then to answer the overtime budget
2 question, you do not see a reduction in this, in
3 this proposed budget. That's primarily because
4 those new FTEs will now count for full staffing
5 likely until the next fiscal year. So we still have
6 to staff as we are today. So that we will not see
7 that reduction in overtime likely until next fiscal
8 year.

9 In answer to how they're going to be used,
10 when we are at complete full staffing, that will
11 allow us to run three ambulances and one engine
12 company essentially 24/7. At this juncture, they
13 would just be backfilling spaces. So we would still
14 be running the three ambulances as we are today. So
15 this is really a growth challenge, and it's very
16 much an influx type of scenario where we'll grow
17 into those new FTEs and use them as efficiently as
18 possible. But it's going to take us a little while
19 to get them fully up to staffing strength. So
20 hopefully, that answers all of your questions
21 effectively.

22 MR. KANYOCK: Is there any other discussion?

23 So seeing there's no -- there's no further
24 discussion, all those in favor say, "Aye."

1 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Aye.

2 MR. KANYOCK: Any opposed, say, "No."

3 The proposal passes.

4 Article 6.

5 MR. SULLIVAN: Five.

6 MS. AMARA: No, that's right.

7 MR. KANYOCK: That's right? Okay. Six.

8 Article 6. To see if the District will vote
9 to raise and appropriate \$40,000 to be set aside in
10 a reserve fund for extraordinary or unforeseen
11 expenditures, or to take any other action relative
12 thereto.

13 MR. SULLIVAN: Article 6. I move that the
14 District vote to appropriate \$40,000 to be set aside
15 in a reserve fund for extraordinary or unforeseen
16 expenditures.

17 MR. KANYOCK: Do I hear a second?

18 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Second.

19 MR. KANYOCK: Is there any discussion?

20 All those in favor say, "Aye."

21 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Aye.

22 MR. KANYOCK: Any opposed say, "No."

23 Article 6 passes.

24 Article 7. To see if the District will vote

1 to raise and appropriate the sum of \$26,813 to pay
2 the Town of Barnstable for tax billing expenses for
3 the fiscal year 2021 or to take any other action
4 relative thereto.

5 (The Board of Commissioners recommends
6 favorable action.)

7 MR. SULLIVAN: Article 7. I move that the
8 District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of
9 \$26,813 to pay the Town of Barnstable for tax
10 billing expenses for fiscal year 2021.

11 MR. KANYOCK: Do I hear a second?

12 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Second.

13 MR. KANYOCK: Is there any discussion?
14 Seeing as there's none, all those in favor say,
15 "Aye."

16 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Aye.

17 MR. KANYOCK: Any opposed say, "No."

18 The ayes have it. The article passes.

19 Article 8. To see if the District will vote
20 to raise and appropriate the sum of 1,339,338 for
21 the purpose of paying compensation to Permanent
22 Personnel for overtime, who respond to fires,
23 drills, and other duty, for the fiscal year 2021, or
24 to take any other action relative thereto.

1 District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of
2 \$79,906 for the purpose of paying compensation for
3 training for overtime for the fiscal year 2021.

4 MR. KANYOCK: Do I hear a second?

5 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Second.

6 MR. KANYOCK: Any discussion?

7 Seeing as there's none, all those in favor
8 say, "Aye."

9 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Aye.

10 MR. KANYOCK: Any opposed say, "No."

11 The article passes.

12 Article 10. To see if the District will
13 vote to authorize the Board of Commissioners to
14 sell, or dispose of, in the best interest of the
15 District, miscellaneous materials with monetary --
16 with a monetary value of less than \$500 per item, or
17 to take any other action relative thereto.

18 (The Board of Commissioners recommends
19 favorable action.)

20 MR. SULLIVAN: Article 10. I move that the
21 District vote to authorize the Board of
22 Commissioners to sell, or dispose of, in the best
23 interest of the District, miscellaneous materials
24 with a monetary value of less than \$500 per item.

1 MR. KANYOCK: Do I hear a second?

2 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Second.

3 MR. KANYOCK: Any discussion?

4 Seeing as there's none, all those in favor
5 say, "Aye."

6 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Aye.

7 THE MODERATOR: Any opposed say, "No."

8 Article 10 passes.

9 Article 11. To see if the District will
10 vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,000 for
11 the Indemnification Fund, or to take any other
12 action relative thereto.

13 (The Board of Commissioners recommends
14 favorable action.)

15 MR. SULLIVAN: Article 11. I move that the
16 District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of
17 \$8,000 for the Indemnification Fund.

18 MR. KANYOCK: Do I hear a second?

19 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Second.

20 MR. KANYOCK: Any discussion?

21 Come, come forward.

22 MS. KRAU: Point of information, what is it?

23 THE REPORTER: Ma'am.

24 MR. KANYOCK: Please say your -- even though

1 we know who you are, please say your name again for
2 the benefit of the --

3 MS. KRAU: Deb Krau, --

4 MR. KANYOCK: Thank you.

5 MS. KRAU: -- Pram Road. Could you please
6 tell me what this fund is?

7 MR. SULLIVAN: It's a fund to cover medical
8 expenses and not otherwise covered for personnel.

9 MS. KRAU: So if all the insurance that's
10 built into the budget and all the disability
11 insurance that's built into the budget still doesn't
12 make the firefighter whole, you get to use this
13 money?

14 MR. SULLIVAN: I don't think it's been used
15 for a long time, but it needs to be there in case it
16 does need to be used.

17 MS. KRAU: I actually thought this was one
18 of the accounts that was going to go away from my
19 prior experience working with this, but I don't
20 know. I don't know how many other people have a
21 fund when all the insurance and all the
22 disability that we pay for, and rightly so, runs
23 out. Could you explain why we need to have this? I
24 heard you -- I heard you, Commissioner Sullivan,

1 said we had to have it, but I'm just wondering
2 what's the rationale?

3 CHIEF BURKE: So the Indemnification Fund is
4 intended to cover costs for recent retirees that
5 were held under contractual obligations that the
6 District has with them to cover certain medical
7 expenses. So this is literally a gap fund for when
8 our current coverage does not protect them the
9 District still has the obligation to pay for them,
10 and the fund is set aside for that purpose.

11 So I think it's a bit of a legacy challenge,
12 which may go to your point, Ms. Krau, about over
13 time this should go away. My understanding is that
14 we're not there yet in terms of when that has
15 actually sunsetted.

16 MS. KRAU: Thank you.

17 MR. KANYOCK: Is there any other discussion?

18 Seeing there's no further discussion, all
19 those in this favor say, "Aye."

20 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Aye.

21 MR. KANYOCK: Any opposed say, "No."

22 The ayes have it, and it passes.

23 Article 12. To see if the District will
24 vote to transfer and appropriate the sum of \$97,350

1 from the Ambulance Account to the Ambulance Billing
2 Expense Account, or to take any other action
3 relative thereto.

4 (The Board of Commissioners recommends
5 favorable action.)

6 MR. SULLIVAN: Article 12. I move that the
7 District vote to transfer and appropriate the sum of
8 \$97,350 from the Ambulance Account for the Ambulance
9 Billing Expense Account.

10 MR. KANYOCK: Do I hear a second?

11 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Second.

12 MR. KANYOCK: Is there any discussion?

13 Seeing as though there's no discussion,
14 those who approve say, "Aye."

15 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Aye.

16 MR. KANYOCK: Any opposed?

17 The ayes have it. Article 12 passes.

18 Article 13. To see if the District will
19 raise and appropriate the sum of \$28,704 for the
20 CMED Operation System for the period of July 20th --
21 July 1, 2020 through June 30, 2021, or to take any
22 other action relative thereto.

23 (The Board of Commissioners recommends
24 favorable action.)

1 MR. SULLIVAN: Article 13. I move the
2 District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of
3 \$28,704 for the CMED Operation System for the period
4 of July 1, 2020 through June 30, 2021.

5 MR. KANYOCK: Do I hear a second?

6 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Second.

7 MR. KANYOCK: Is there any discussion?

8 Seeing as there's no discussion -- do I have
9 a discussion? No. Seeing there's no discussion,
10 all those in favor say, "Aye."

11 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Aye.

12 MR. KANYOCK: Any opposed say, "No."

13 The ayes have it. Article 13 passes.

14 Article 14. To see if the District will
15 vote to authorize the Treasurer to enter into
16 compensating balance agreements for the fiscal year
17 2021, or to take any other action relative thereto.

18 (The Board of Commissioners recommends
19 favorable actions.)

20 MR. SULLIVAN: Article 14. I move that the
21 District vote to authorize the Treasurer to enter
22 into compensating balance agreements for the fiscal
23 year 2021.

24 MR. KANYOCK: Do I hear a second?

1 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Second.

2 MR. KANYOCK: All those in favor say, "Aye."

3 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Aye.

4 MR. KANYOCK: Any opposed say, "No." Oh,
5 I'm sorry. Any discussion? I missed that, sorry.
6 All in those in favor. All right.

7 Any opposed?

8 No. It passes, Article 14 passes.

9 Article 15. To see if the District will
10 vote to transfer any sum from Free Cash in order to
11 reduce the property tax for fiscal year 2021, or to
12 take any other action relative thereto.

13 (The Board of Commissioners will make their
14 recommendation at this meeting.)

15 MR. SULLIVAN: Article 15. I move that the
16 District vote to transfer zero money from Free Cash
17 to reduce the property tax for fiscal year 2021.

18 MR. KANYOCK: Do I hear a second?

19 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Second.

20 MR. KANYOCK: Any discussion.

21 MR. CROSS: Good evening, I'm Peter Cross.
22 I'm the former chairman of the Board of
23 Commissioners. I ask not to be -- not to be
24 re-elected after five years. That was plenty. So

1 Ms. Cronin is now the Board of Commissioners
2 chairperson.

3 But seeing that this unusual year has taken
4 us in another direction, when Free Cash came out
5 this year from the State, it's neither "free" nor
6 "cash." It's not like it's -- it's not like it's
7 something we can go out and spend. At that time I
8 was still chairman, and we discussed it and thought
9 that it would be prudent for your Board of
10 Commissioners to hang onto the money in Free Cash to
11 see what comes of the COVID-19 pandemic, which we're
12 in the middle of right now, and be advised that the
13 Board of Commissioners cannot spend a single penny
14 of Free Cash without a vote of the electorate, you,
15 as the stakeholders. So if for some reason we come
16 up short or there's an emergency of some variety and
17 we need to get the Free Cash, we will have to warn a
18 special meeting and assemble the voters and put a
19 figure to you at that time.

20 So we have considered this carefully and
21 made this recommendation. Also, entering into this
22 discussion or entering into our thinking was a
23 significant increase this year in ambulance
24 revenues, and the ambulance revenues from this year,

1 I believe, offsets what we would have put in
2 traditionally for Free Cash. So that is our
3 recommendation, that Free Cash not be allocated
4 right now, and if it's needed going forward, we
5 would want a special meeting of the voters and deal
6 with it then.

7 Thank you.

8 MR. KANYOCK: Is there any further
9 discussion?

10 Seeing as there's none, all those in favor
11 say, "Aye."

12 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Aye.

13 MR. KANYOCK: Any opposed say, "No."

14 The ayes have it.

15 Article 14 passes.

16 Article 15. To see if the District will
17 vote to transfer any sum from Free Cash --

18 MS. AMARA: No.

19 MR. KANYOCK: Oh, I'm sorry.

20 MS. AMARA: Article 16.

21 MR. KANYOCK: We did that.

22 MS. AMARA: We did.

23 MR. KANYOCK: I did. I'm sorry.

24 Article 16. To see if the District will

1 vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100,000 to
2 the Stabilization Fund, or to take any other action
3 relative thereto.

4 (The Board of Commissioners recommends
5 favorable action.)

6 MR. SULLIVAN: Article 16. I move that the
7 District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of
8 \$100,000 to the Stabilization Fund.

9 MR. KANYOCK: Do I hear a second?

10 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Second.

11 MR. KANYOCK: Any discussion?

12 Seeing as there's no discussion, all those
13 if favor say, "Aye."

14 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Aye.

15 MR. KANYOCK: Any opposed say, "No."

16 The ayes have it. The article passes.

17 Article 17. Proposed By-Law Amendment
18 Proposed By The By-Law Committee as printed in the
19 warrant.

20 (The By-Law Committed recommends favorable
21 action.)

22 I'll ask Mr. Munafo to move this forward.

23 MR. MUNAFO: I move -- Article 17. I move
24 that the District vote to amend the District by-laws

1 as printed in the warrant.

2 MR. KANYOCK: Do I hear a second?

3 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Second.

4 MR. KANYOCK: Any discussion?

5 Come forward, please.

6 MR. KRAU: My name is Ralph Krau, Pram Road.
7 I have an inquiry into the item to -- it says it's
8 concerning "decorative street lights." What are we
9 referring to? And I'm looking at we have beautiful
10 lights on Main Street. We have beautiful lights on
11 Bearses Way, and now, we're having new decorative
12 lights put on Sea Street. Are they covered, or are
13 they not?

14 Thank you.

15 MR. SULLIVAN: The District does not pay for
16 the decorative lights in town. The town does.

17 MR. KANYOCK: Okay. Any other discussion,
18 question?

19 Seeing as there's none, all those in favor
20 say, "Aye."

21 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Aye.

22 MR. KANYOCK: Any opposed say, "No."

23 Seeing there are none opposed, Article 17
24 passes.

1 Okay. Articles 18 and 19 are inserted in
2 this warrant as required by the Hyannis Fire
3 District By-Laws Article II, Section 2. They appear
4 exactly as they were presented at the petitioner's
5 request.

6 So everybody understands, a "yes" vote would
7 approve this. A "no" vote would not approve it. It
8 would not move forward.

9 The article reads as this as presented by
10 the petitioner: To see if the District with vote to
11 authorize the Board of Commissioners to purchase and
12 install a dedication plaque to honor all members of
13 the founding building committee and those who served
14 on any building committee associated with the
15 construction and/or dedication of the fire station
16 to be designed by all involved in honor of the
17 historical preservation past plaque of 1965 to 1987.

18 (The Board of Commissioners does not
19 recommend favorable action.)

20 Is there anyone who would like to bring this
21 article forward?

22 Yeah, does anybody like to bring this
23 article forward?

24 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Bring it forward.

1 Second.

2 MR. KANYOCK: All right. We have a forward
3 and a second.

4 Yeah, what's the motion? The person that
5 wants to bring it forward I need a motion.

6 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Motion for approval.

7 MR. CABRAL: Peter Cabral, Maple Street.
8 The motion is as printed in the warrant, and I moved
9 it be approved.

10 MR. KANYOCK: Is that adequate?

11 MS. AMARA: Sure.

12 MR. KANYOCK: Okay. Do I hear a second?

13 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Second.

14 MR. KANYOCK: Okay. Is there any
15 discussion?

16 Please keep it to three minutes.

17 MR. GALLAGHER: Thank you, Mr. Moderator. I
18 deeply respect the honor of speaking.

19 My name is Richard Gallagher. I moved out
20 of the District soon after 2014 when I had served
21 24 years as Hyannis Fire Commissioner. I was
22 chairman of this board for some time. I was vice
23 chairman for quite a long time.

24 One of the things when I first came on this

1 job in 1990 was the first chief I had -- I had
2 spoken to three chiefs prior to Chief Brunelle, was
3 that we were having a very serious issue with the
4 deterioration of the old station. That was back in
5 1990. I took that seriously.

6 And as time went on, I brought it -- I
7 sponsored it, along with Chief Brunelle after having
8 a meeting with him after he was appointed chief, and
9 I brought it to my Board. And we had a good Board.
10 The same Board was intact for quite some time.
11 Commissioner Sullivan was on it, and we moved
12 forward to do something with the building. That
13 took an enormous amount of time and effort with the
14 Board. We were able to secure the first 675,000
15 from the citizens after we educated them. We had
16 done our homework and research.

17 Further on, I'm going to fast forward this
18 because I only have a couple of minutes. Further
19 on, we then hired an architect and engineer to take
20 a look at the old building. We had land issues that
21 we had no land to put a new building up. We looked
22 at the old station in Hyannis Port as a substation.
23 We ultimately sold that. We had some land that the
24 Town gave us, that I went to the town counsel. I

1 asked my commissioners to join me. They didn't seem
2 to want to come. Chief Brunelle and I secured that
3 land with the approval of the Board, of course.

4 And then after that, I became the chairman
5 of the building committee with the endorsement of
6 the Board of Commissioners. I was honored to do so,
7 and I was honored to be a commissioner. Thanks to
8 all of you. When I did that, I took on a very
9 serious position. Chairman of anything is serious.

10 When we finally made our mark to step
11 forward to the citizens that we were going to do
12 something, a lot of research had to go into this.
13 This Board has no idea what we did, because they've
14 never asked us, and they never studied it. Because
15 if they had, they would have contacted at least me
16 or somebody.

17 But so what I did was I tried to reach out
18 when I heard back in February 2019 that they were
19 going to -- I asked Commissioner Dennis Sullivan,
20 who was on the Board with me a long time -- I called
21 him, thinking he was my friend and ally, and I still
22 think he is, but I don't know. But in any event, I
23 called him, and I asked him what was going to happen
24 with the dedication plaque, which would be coming up

1 in the spring of 2019, the station was getting
2 completed.

3 He said to me, "Those" --

4 MR. KANYOCK: We have --

5 MR. GALLAGHER: "Those numbers are -- your
6 Building" --

7 MR. KANYOCK: 30 more seconds.

8 MR. GALLAGHER: -- "Committee's not going to
9 be on it."

10 So, again, I'll fast forward a little more.
11 I was disappointed to hear that. I don't know why
12 he said that. I was hopeful he would have stood up
13 for us but didn't happen.

14 Later that season, I asked in June of --
15 well, they had a vote. The Board of Commissioners
16 had a vote on June 13, 2019, and they voted and had
17 one meeting, as the record shows in the minutes, one
18 meeting, one discussion, one vote to put a
19 dedication plaque up, very thoughtful. And they put
20 all their names on it, dedicated to the men and
21 women.

22 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: He's out of time.

23 MR. GALLAGHER: It's a very --

24 MR. KANYOCK: Yes.

1 MR. GALLAGHER: -- it's a very nice.

2 MR. KANYOCK: It's time.

3 MR. GALLAGHER: Okay.

4 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Time.

5 MR. GALLAGHER: Well, my point is this. I
6 ask you citizens tonight to stand with us and my
7 committee --

8 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Time.

9 MR. GALLAGHER: -- that was made up of --

10 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Time.

11 MR. GALLAGHER: -- very --

12 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Time.

13 MR. KANYOCK: Wait till -- let him finish.

14 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Time.

15 MR. KANYOCK: Just make your point.

16 MR. GALLAGHER: Uh-huh.

17 MR. KANYOCK: You've got -- you've got 30
18 seconds. Go ahead.

19 MR. GALLAGHER: Okay.

20 MR. KANYOCK: Okay.

21 MR. GALLAGHER: I just want you to know who
22 the committee was. These are outstanding citizens
23 among us all, Chief Harold Brunelle, the Honorable
24 Gary Brown, who's here with us tonight, Gloria

1 Rudman, she was in tears when she heard this was
2 going to happen, Leo Fein, excellent member of our
3 community, and Rick Penn, whose father was on the
4 1965 plaque, two plaques.

5 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Time.

6 MR. GALLAGHER: So that's what have to say.

7 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Time.

8 MR. GALLAGHER: I ask for your support
9 tonight that we will --

10 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Time.

11 MR. GALLAGHER: -- put up a plaque --

12 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Time.

13 MR. GALLAGHER: -- that honors the people
14 who --

15 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Time.

16 MR. GALLAGHER: -- served this District. I
17 think --

18 MR. KANYOCK: Okay. Mr. Gallagher,
19 that's --

20 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Time.

21 MR. KANYOCK: You had your time.

22 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Time.

23 MR. KANYOCK: You've had -- you've had five
24 minutes.

1 Thank you.

2 MR. GALLAGHER: Thank you very much.

3 MR. KANYOCK: Is there any further
4 discussion?

5 MS. DAGWAN: Good evening, I'm Debra Dagwan,
6 and this is my neighborhood. I'm here to speak also
7 as town counselor.

8 And I do want to speak briefly about this,
9 this topic. When this fire station was being
10 proposed, there were two camps, both very concerned
11 about this community. One camp was for the citizens
12 of the community. One camp was for the
13 firefighters. Both camps very important. There
14 were lots of meetings where they came together.
15 They didn't agree on a lot of things. A lot of
16 discussion went on. I was dis- -- I disagreed with
17 the cost of the building, but right now, -- excuse
18 me. But right now, we have a -- it's here now. We
19 have a brand-new building, and my concern is that
20 people who worked on this project aren't being --
21 weren't recognized or haven't been recognized. I
22 think there should be a little plaque.

23 Joe Chilli who was in between both groups.
24 He was a member of the civic association. He also

1 was a commissioner here and a member of the Hyannis
2 Civic Association. Those of us, myself have been
3 here 40 years in this community. Joe, Gloria used
4 to come to the civic association. We used to have
5 the meetings right here at this -- at this fire
6 station, and to not see that he's being recognized,
7 not seeing the counselors who worked so hard over
8 the years to support things that went on at this
9 fire station, Gary Brown, bless his heart, Mr.
10 Tobey, who passed away, Gloria, and others that I
11 feel, again, should be -- there should be a plaque
12 dedicated to these individuals. It's the right
13 thing to do.

14 We have to come together as a community.
15 You know, because people -- one person doesn't like
16 another, that's not a reason to go against that. As
17 again, I'm going to say it, this is my neighborhood.

18 I know who's done stuff here, and it brings
19 me to tears to see some of the people that worked so
20 hard here that we just skipped. You got the Chief
21 Brunelle. He's a firefighter. This is -- this is
22 what -- this is about -- this is his job. I'm not a
23 firefighter. Fine, I don't need to be on no plaque.
24 But how do we skip the person who ran this building

1 over these years? How do we do that? And I say
2 that others, if you were firefighters, your turn's
3 going to come, too, and you want people to stand up
4 for the work that you've done. I'm appreciative of
5 what the firefighters have done in this community
6 each and every one of you as you move forward and
7 continue, but I hope that the citizens here tonight
8 will vote yes on this. Listen to someone who's
9 lived in this neighborhood for 40 years and who
10 cares. Put the little petty differences aside, and
11 let's try to do what's right. I ask that you vote
12 in favor of this.

13 Thank you.

14 MS. LUDTKE: Hi, thank you for this
15 opportunity. My name is Betty Ludtke, and I lived
16 on Wachusett Avenue. My family has owned property
17 in this community for over a hundred years, and I
18 will say I have four children. And they've all --
19 not in this fire station but the one who was -- that
20 was here before. They've all come over and had
21 tours. And my daughter, she won a competition at
22 her school, and she got to ride in your antique fire
23 truck, which was such a highlight. I rode with her,
24 and what a glorious thing.

1 And that's why I want to follow-up on the
2 woman who spoke so eloquently before me about
3 community and history and frankly, doing the right
4 thing. And I think if you look at what's going on
5 right now on some of the monuments and dedications
6 that are being torn down, monuments and dedications
7 matter. We should do it right, and we should honor
8 those who gave so much to bring us this gorgeous
9 building and help protect our community.

10 Thank you so much.

11 MR. KANYOCK: Is there anybody else who
12 would like to come forward for discussion on Article
13 18?

14 MR. BROWN: Good evening, I'm a son of
15 Hyannis, as many people here are, including Peter.

16 THE REPORTER: Name and address.

17 MR. KANYOCK: Oh, I'm sorry.

18 Yeah, your name, please, and your address.

19 MR. BROWN: Gary Brown, Chestnut Street.

20 MR. KANYOCK: Thank you.

21 MR. BROWN: I spent hours -- thank you.

22 I spent hours, nights after work coming into
23 these meetings to join the comradeship and enjoying
24 the direction. It finally ended up. We don't want

1 to look back at some of the hard times we went
2 through, but we ended up really good. And I think
3 that everybody here should be rewarded.

4 When I was a young boy, I used to come here
5 to the fire station because it was right across the
6 street, and in the fire station, was a plaque. And
7 it was '65, I believe, 1965. One the plaque members
8 on it was Brown, and to find out, he was a first
9 cousin of mine.

10 And I thought, Gee, wouldn't it be great if
11 my name got on a plaque as well? So for self
12 services, that's my reasoning behind it. Besides I
13 think that that is what's right for the vote.

14 Thank you.

15 MR. KANYOCK: Thank you.

16 Any other further discussion?

17 MR. CROSS: I have a question. Peter Cross.
18 Again, I am also like Gary Brown, a son of Hyannis.
19 My grandfather was a firefighter here from 1969 --
20 excuse me, 1929 until his death in 1964. My father
21 was the moderator of the Hyannis Fire District for
22 35 years.

23 When you come into public service, you don't
24 look to get your name on a plaque, and Debra Dagwan,

1 Counselor Dagwan, spoke eloquently. Yes, she did.

2 And you're absolutely right, Debra. When
3 you said it's about Chief Brunelle and it's about
4 the firefighters. I mean, we've talked -- as a
5 Board, talked about the dedication plaque. The fact
6 is, the first building committee didn't get the job
7 done because they misread the community, and it took
8 us four votes and cost us a lot of time and a lot of
9 money, literally, millions of dollars in inflation
10 charges to get this building built.

11 And when we were all done, we put together a
12 list of people, and we came up with somewhere close
13 to 25 or 30 people, in there somewhere. And part of
14 the discussion was, it's not about us.

15 If you go into public service to get your
16 name on a plaque, you're doing the wrong thing. If
17 you go into public service as a firefighter
18 paramedic, you're doing the right thing, and it's
19 not about us. It's not about commissioners. It's
20 not about building committee members. It's about
21 the men and women that run this building and work
22 this building seven days a week, 24 hours a day, 365
23 days a year, and that's why the Board voted to
24 dedicate this building to the men and women of the

1 Hyannis Fire Department past, present, and future,
2 period.

3 Thank you.

4 MR. KANYOCK: Any further discussion of
5 Article 18?

6 Seeing there's no further discussion, all
7 those in favor of Article 18 please say, "Aye."

8 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Aye.

9 MR. KANYOCK: All those opposed say, "No."

10 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: No.

11 MR. KANYOCK: All right. It's going to be
12 tough. We're going to have to do a count. Can I
13 ask any non-voters to go to the back of the parking
14 lot for a second so we can just get an eye on the
15 voters, a little separation.

16 Okay. Can I ask any non-voters.

17 MS. AMARA: If you don't have a red card.

18 MR. KANYOCK: If you have a red card, to
19 please just go to the back of the lot so we can have
20 some separation so we're able to get all the voter's
21 cards, please?

22 Mr. Gallagher, would you mind going to the
23 back of lot --

24 MR. GALLAGHER: Oh, sure.

1 MR. KANYOCK: -- just so we're able to see
2 everyone?

3 Thank you. Want to make sure we get this
4 right.

5 Okay. All of those in favor of Article 18
6 please say so by saying, "Aye" and raising your red
7 cards.

8 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Aye.

9 MR. KANYOCK: Raise them high.

10 Okay. Hold them there. We need to take a
11 count.

12 Anybody else take a count besides me?

13 Madam Clerk, did you get a count, too? Why
14 don't we just -- I'm counting 16, but I want to --
15 I'm going to count again.

16 MR. ATSALIS: Keep your card up. 23.

17 MR. KANYOCK: 23? How about on that side?
18 What about on that side?

19 MR. ATSALIS: I got them all.

20 MR. KANYOCK: Okay. Okay. We have 23 for.
21 Those against or no, please raise your
22 cards.

23 Demetrius, do you mind doing it again?

24 MR. ATSALIS: 27.

1 MR. KANYOCK: 27.

2 MR. ATSALIS: Yes.

3 Yeah, Deb, do it with me. Come on.

4 MS. DAGWAN: Well, I'm not argumentative.

5 MR. ATSALIS: Well, Deb, come on.

6 MS. DAGWAN: I think it would be nice if
7 you're going to do it.

8 MR. ATSALIS: You can count it, Deb. I'll
9 count on --

10 MS. DAGWAN: Maybe have people stand up.

11 MR. ATSALIS: One, two, three, four, five,
12 six, seven, eight, nine, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16
13 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25, 26.

14 I'm abstaining.

15 MR. KANYOCK: Well, that's 26.

16 MR. ATSALIS: 23.

17 MR. KANYOCK: So we have 26 nos, 23 yeses.
18 The motion does not past.

19 Do I need to read 19?

20 MS. AMARA: Well, you have to take some
21 action on it.

22 MR. KANYOCK: So we're done?

23 MS. AMARA: It's there, so --

24 MR. KANYOCK: So it's hard to do, but so I

1 have to do it?

2 MS. AMARA: Yeah.

3 MR. ATSALIS: Nays 27.

4 THE MODERATOR: Nays 27. So the correct
5 account, we did have 27 against, 23 for.

6 Okay. Article 19. To see if the District
7 will vote to raise and appropriate and/or transfer
8 and appropriate from available funds the following
9 amount of \$2,999.00 for a District dedication
10 plaque.

11 (The Board of Commissioners does not
12 recommend favorable action.)

13 Anybody like to bring this forward?

14 As no one's bringing it forward, motion does
15 not count.

16 MS. AMARA: So shouldn't do anything.

17 MR. KANYOCK: Article 20. To transact any
18 other business that may legally come before the
19 meeting, or to take any other action relative
20 thereto.

21 Any other business we need to talk about?

22 MR. SULLIVAN: I move we adjourn.

23 THE TOWN'S PEOPLE: Second.

24 MR. KANYOCK: The meeting is adjourned.
